iston returned to their home recently at Depoe Bay, Oregon.

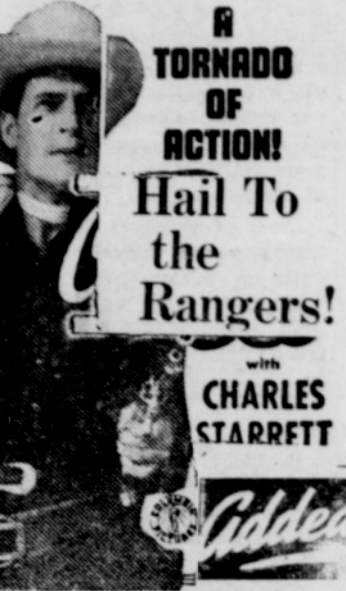

Mrs. Don Montgomery left Monday morning for Portland for medical treatment.

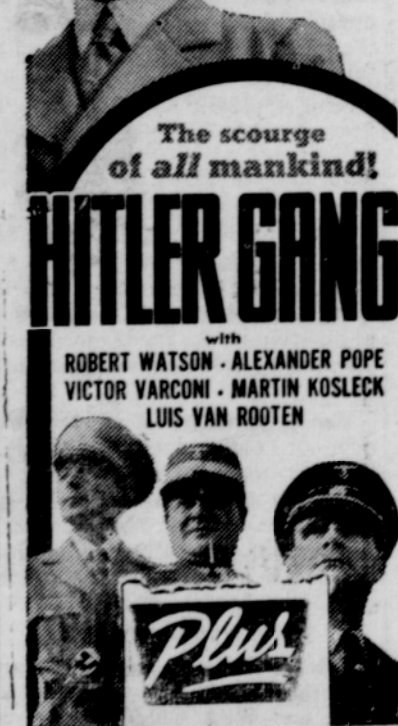
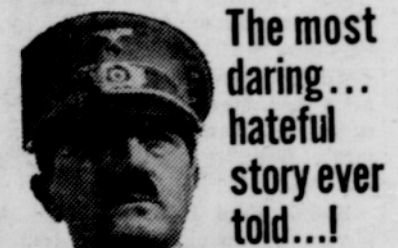

Several Cases in City Court Lately

Ashland police are credited with several arrests this week, all of which were heard in city court, where disposition of their cases were made. Arrested on Wednesday, the 24th was Jack B. Wagner, federal meat inspector on a charge of parking his car in a reserved parking zone. Three dollars and \$2.50 costs were assessed against him, which were paid.

Dwaine Dell Morrison of Ashland was arrested on a charge of reckless driving and was fined the minimum \$25.00 and \$2.50 costs and was given a 10-day suspended jail sentence on condition of good behavior and that his driver's license be revoked for one year.

Bertha Rose Freese was assessed \$25 and \$10 costs on a charge of trespassing and given 10 days in jail. The jail sentence was suspended on payment of the fine, following good behavior and on condition that she repair and pay for damages on the J. H. Like's property.

Wm. Delaney of Route 2, Ashland was fined \$12.50 and was given a 10 day jail sentence for being drunk and disorderly. The jail sentence was suspended on good behavior, and providing that he did not driving until he secured a driver's license.
