A Resoution

The following resolution was adopted by the Jackson County Chapter of the Izaak Walton League at a meeting held in Medford recently.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Rogue River runs through Jackson, Josephine and Curry Counties in Oregon before it reaches the Pacific Ocean, and,

WHEREAS, said Rogue River, unpolluted, without any more dams therein and in as near a state of nature as possible, has almost unlimited possibilities as a recreational asset for scenery, outings, camping, cabins, auto and river resorts, tourists and for steelhead, trout and salmon fishing and is exceedingly valuable and is nationally known and famous for all the above qualities and since there very few of such rivers in the United States that have such outstanding recreational qualities, and,

WHEREAS, the Rogue River is populated almost entirely by migratory anadromous fish such as chinook salmon, steelhead trout, silver-side salmon and cutthroat trout and for the perpetuation of the runs of these fish, it is necessary that they have easy access from the ocean to the upper spawning beds to spawn and that the resulting fingerling fish and spawned out adult steelhead trout have free down stream escapement back to the ocean, and,

WHEREAS, any more dams in the Rogue River proper, will destroy much of the river for scenery, camping, outings, auto courts and summer cabins and will threaten the runs of migratory fish with extermination and will thus destroy much of the great recreational value of the Rogue River, and,

WHEREAS, it is now asserted that in the Rogue River Valley, further irrigation water is needed for agriculture interests, and it is possible to supply large additional amounts of irrigation water by impounding the waters of the tributaries of the Rogue River, such as Elk Creek, Trail Creek, Little Butte Creek, Evans Creek, Bear Creek, Jump Off Joe Creek, Graves Creek, Illinois River and the Applegate River and not in any substantial degree damage the Rogue River, proper, and,

WHEREAS, there is now a State law, prohibiting construction of any additional dams on the Rogue River below a point about at the mouth of Bib Butte Creek.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Jackson County Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America actively op-

pose the building or construction of any more dams in the Rogue River.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to all the members from Oregon of the House of Representatives in Congress and the United States Senate and to any other persons or organizations who are interested therein.
