More men than women have tuberculosis and the greatest number of people having tuberculosis are between the ages of 30 and 59, according to a report from the Oregon State Department of Health Vital Statistics Bureau.

The report shows that from January 1 to May 1, 1945, there were 193 new cases of tuberculosis reported in Oregon. Of these, 81 were women and 112 were men.

Of the 81 women, the largest number of cases (49) were in the age group of 15 to 34. Among the men, 72 of the 112 cases were between the ages of 30 and 59.

Such figures, say Mr. Saidie Orr Dunbar, Executive Secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association, point to the need for stressing certain aspects of the tuberculosis work in this state. First, she says, the fact that the cases among females are found in

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the child-bearing ages make it important the chest X-rays for expectant mothers be considered a necessity. The fact that the age group among men is that of the workers in our industries, points to the need for stressing the Chest X-ray Surveys in our industrial plants. "And," says Mrs. Dunbar, "find

ing cases of tuberculosis during the important years of the life of our people, shows us clearly that we must provide proper hospitalization facilities for the care of these people and that parents of young children be separated from contact with the children, thus the chain of infection may be broken and children prevented from breaking down with tuberculosis when they reach the same important age in their lives."

Copco Reduces Rates at Crescent City, Cal.

Crescent City, May 21.-Shortly after June 1 electric users in Crescent City and surrounding Del Norte County will receive substantial reductions in their electric rates as a result of the purchase of the electric properties serving that area by The California Oregon Power Com-

pany. The rate reduction is being made in order that electric rates in Crescent City and Del Norte County conform with the lower rates effective in the other terri- Ph. 2-1131. tories served by The California Oregon Power Company. These rates, which officials of that company say are among the lowest in the nation, will reduce the elec tric bills of customers in this territory from 26 to 60 per cent, depending upon the amount of electricity used.

The California Oregon Power Company is acquiring these properties from the Public Utilities California Corporation of San Francisco.

The company announced plans also for an extensive construction program calling for the building of a transmission line connecting Crescent City with the California Oregon power system and extending service to other communities in Del Norte county. Appli-

Oregon Traffic Volume Higher in 1944

The average daily volume of traffic on Oregon highways in 1944 was slightly higher than in 1943, according to Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, who announced today that the traffic volume so far this year also is slightly higher than in the previous year.

The average volume in 1944 ranged from 3,520 vehicles in January to a high of 5,850 in September. In 1943, the average daily volume ranged from 3,300 vehicles in January, to a high of 5,593 in July.

For the first quarter of 1945, the average daily volume showed an increase of nearly 13 per cent over the same period of 1944.

These figures indicate, Farrell said, that there is need for increased care in driving to avoid accidents.

"The danger of vehicles being involved in accidents is, of course greater in heavy volumes of traffic," he said. "The fact that traffic volume in Oregon is on the increase is sufficient reason for


