

Not Needed This Year Oregon driver's licenses, issued on or after June 15, 1941, need not be renewed this year, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell said today. The 1945 legislature assembly extended the time of tnese licenses to June 30, 1947.

The numbers of all licenses thus extended bear the prefix "oR", Farrell said.

"Many drivers apparently believe they are required to renew their driver's licenses this year, but the act of the 1945 legislature extends the time these licenses baby of Grants Pass visited her are valid through the next two years," Farrell said.

The secretary of state explained it is not necessary that a new license card be obtained, showing the new expiration date. All enforcement authorities throughout the nation have been notified of the legislature's action in extending the time the present licenses are valid.
