

Many Accidents Due to Faulty Headlights

Accidents reported as a result of drivers and pedestrians becoming confused by cars with but one headlight functioning at night were cited by Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell as evidence of the need for greater attention to lights as a safety factor on the highways and streets at night.

Farrell said that in one case, a pedestrian was struck when the person on foot mistook the single light of an approaching car for the outside light when it was the inside light that was functioning. In other cases, approaching drivers have been confused and failed to give adequate clearance for approaching cars, proceeding with but one headlight functioning.

"One headlight cars are a definite accident hazard on our streets and highways at night and drivers should make every effort to avoid causing these hazards," Farrell said.

The secretary of state urged drivers to check their lights regularly, to make sure both lights are functioning and that they are

properly adjusted.

"Improperly adjusted headlights also constitute a serious accident hazard, because they may blind the approaching driver or pedestrian," he said.

S. P. Plans Day to Honor Servicemen

In honor of the more than 19,000 Southern Pacific men and women who have entered the armed forces, the 92,000 home front employes of the railroad will observe their third annual "Southern Pacific War Service Day" June 14, it was announced today.

At noon and evening rallies held over the company's far-flung lines and agencies in the United States, speakers will pay tribute to the railroad's fighters throughout the world, with appeals for support of the Seventh War Loan, blood banks, and all other phases of the war effort.

Special homage will be paid the railroad's honored war dead, now numbering approximately 200. They represent every front and every service, their heroism recorded in the employees' monthly magazine and their memory preserved on the company's service flag.

Miniature service flags bearing the number "19,000" will be worn by the railroad employes as lapel tags to mark the day.

"We are proud of our associates in the armed forces," said President A. T. Mercier in a message to the company's men and women regarding the special tribute. "To bring them home, safely and soon, it is our job on the home front to keep the Victory Trains rolling and to give wholehearted support to all war activities."

Mr. Long was a member of the local Elk's lodge, No. 944 and of the local Masonic and Shrine orders. Services were held at two o'clock in charge of the Masonic lodge. Interment was made in the Masonic Lawn cemetery at Sacramento, California.
