- 1. Do not open hose or open faucets when payin for 5,000 to 15,000 square feet. Use spray nozzle with hole no larger than 1/4-inch in diameter.
- 2. Do not set sprinkler so it will interfere with traffic on sidewalks.
- 3. Do not allow water to run off your property on streets, gutters, alleys or on your neighbor's property.
- 4. Do not have leaky faucets, water closets or fixtures on your premises.
- 5. WATER MUST BE TURNED OFF IMMEDIATELY IN CASE OF FIRE.
- 6. DO NOT RUN CITY WATER AT NIGHT BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 10 P. M. AND 5 A. M. This restriction is to allow the orchardists on the high points

to get sufficient water for their crops.

There is plenty of water if it is not wasted.

Those violating any of these rules may find their service disconnected.
