

ASHLAND WHIPS CENTRAL POINT

A rejuvenated Ashland baseball team won its second game in a row Sunday when they defeated Central Point 10 to 8 on Fuller Field. Ashland, with Charley Douglas doing the pitching, held a 6-0 lead in the sixth frame when Fred Jones relieved him. Between Jones and Jack Zittercob, who finished the game, Central Point closed the gap. Douglas was credited with the victory.

The win put Ashland in a tie with Central Point for fourth place in the league and strengthened their hopes for a spot in the Shaughnessy play-offs to be held at Medford about the middle of August.

Douglas had eight strikeouts, four hits, three walks, and two errors.

Jones, pitching one and one-third innings, allowed five hits, one walk, one error, and six runs. Zittercob, pitcher for one and one-third innings, allowed two runs on three hits, no walks, and no errors.

Arnold Gosnell was best at bat with a double and a triple out of three times at bat. Coleman of Central Point had four hits out of five times up.

Miller made four spectacular catches in the center field, with left fielder Bill Menefee making another on the final out with two men on base.

Medford, meanwhile, took a firmer grip on third place when they turned back Butte Falls 25 to 6 at Medford. Klamath Navy vs. Marines game was postponed.

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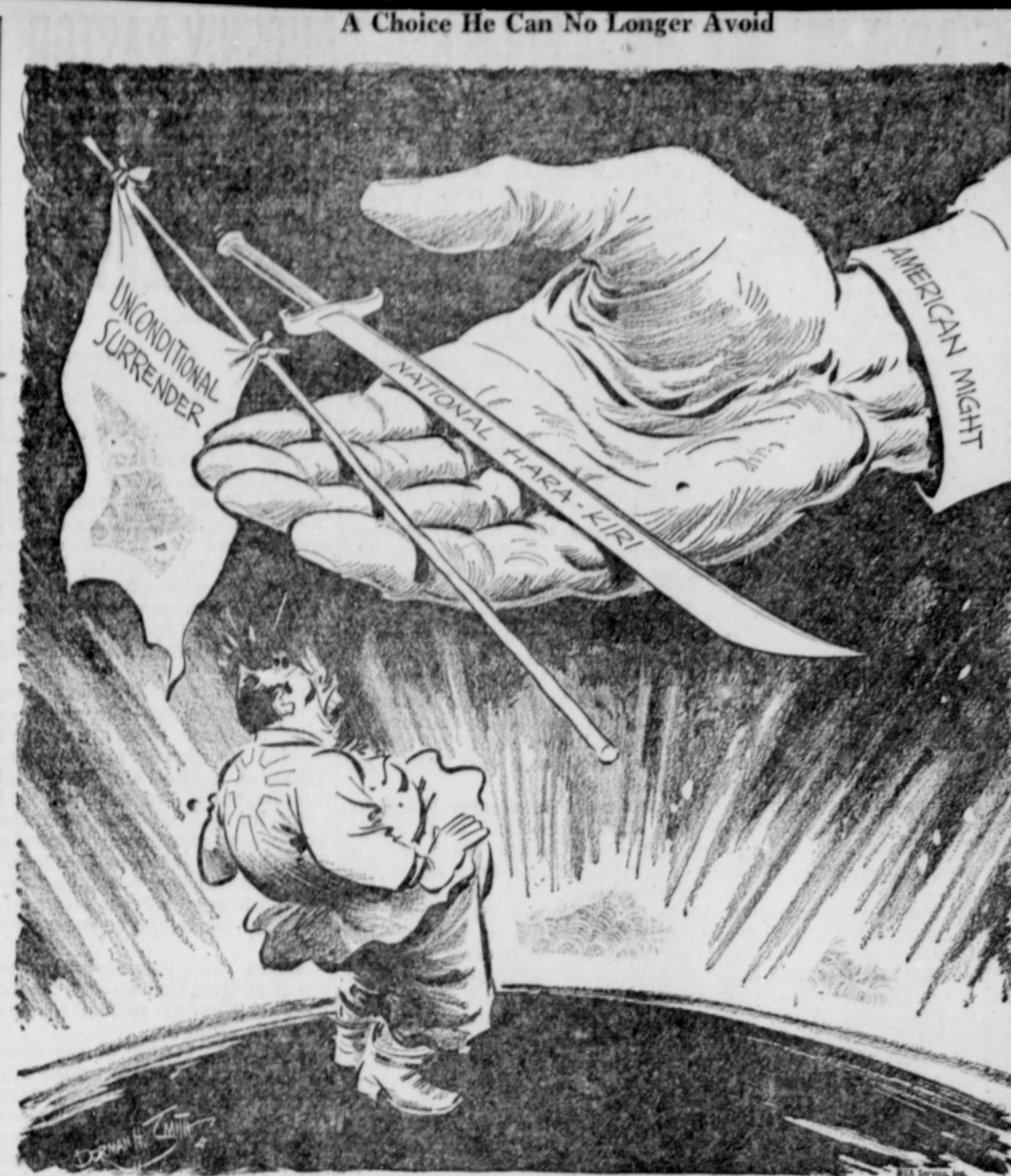
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MEN AND WOMEN IN SERVICE

Harold F. Chrisman, (015961), Colonel, Finance Department, United States Army, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chrisman, 265 Almond street, Ashland, Oregon, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious services in support of combat operations, from 31 December 1944 to 2 May 1945, in Italy. Serving as the Fifth Army Finance Officer, Colonel Chrisman rendered notable services in coordinating and expediting the activities of the five attached Finance Disbursing Sections and the seven Division and Corps Finance Sections which render finance service to the Fifth Army. His thorough and precise understanding of his responsibilities and duties, his discretion and loyalty greatly facilitated the conduct of finance operations within the Fifth Army and between Fifth Army and other headquarters. He rendered valuable assistance in formulating financing procedures relative to local procurement problems and in promoting Soldiers' Savings Plans. His expeditious handling of enormous quantities of funds captured from the enemy and his prompt establishment of finance facilities to service troops during redeployment status were exceptional accomplishments. His service contributed materially to the successes attained in Italy, and reflects credit upon himself and the Army of the United States. Entered military service from Corvallis, Oregon.
