LOCAL BOARDS GET AUTHORITY OF SPECIAL FOOD ISSUANCE

Local War Price and Rationing Boards are being given more authority to issue extra food rations to persons who need them because of illness. Boards have been granted such rations on the basis of a chart prepared by a committee of the National Research Council. But extra rations for illnesses other than those listed on the chart have had to have the approval of the district of regional Medical Committee. Under the new plan, the boards may be instructed to issue more rationed foods than are listed on the chart for various illnesses, and issue specified amounts of rationed foods for diseases other than those listed. To apply for additional food rations for medical reasons, the person needing them, and his physician, fill out a simple form that gives OPA the necessary information.

RATIONING BY MAIL

Your War Price and Rationing Board is a busy place, as you would know if you'd had occasion to visit it. You may even have been a little irked because you've had to wait to transact your business. Next time, why not mail in your application for gasoline, shoes, sugar, or what have you? It's been demonstrated that applications that are mailed in can be processed, on the average, in three minutes, while those brought in personally usually take half an hour. You will be saving your time and speeding up the work of the board if you take advantage of this opportunity to contact the local board by mail.

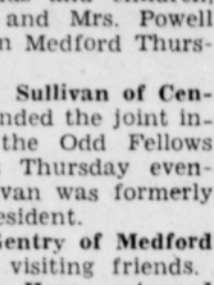

Pacific 1-2 Punch

Here is the team that the Army Air Forces has assigned to the task of directing the aerial destruction of Japan. Its two main branches are the Strategic and the Tactical. To the Strategic Air Force, under General Spaatz, goes the job of heavy bomber assault on Japan's industries, communications and home bases. With headquarters on Guam, he will be directly responsible to General Marshall. The other "fist" of the aerial one-two punch is the Tactical Air Force, under General Kenney. With probable headquarters on Okinawa, he will operate under General MacArthur. His flyers will work in closer conjunction with the ground forces than Spaatz's behind-the-lines bombers. They will work close to the fighting lines, bombing enemy troop concentrations, strong points, disrupting combat area communications and transportation. Kenney's Far Eastern Air Forces includes the 5th, 7th and 13th Air Forces. Spaatz's strategic group is made up of the 20th Air Force (B-29's) and the 8th Air Force, of European fame.

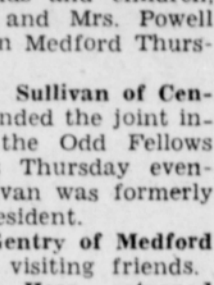

PHOENIX PASTOR SCORES HIT AT VESPER SERVICE

The Rev. Fitz Dodson, student pastor of the Presbyterian Church at Phoenix for the summer months, made a hit with the worshippers at the Union Vesper services in Lithia Park Sunday.

He took the Bible incident which tells of Jesus rising from the table, girding himself with a towel, and washing his disciples' feet, as the basis for his remarks. To this he added the story of Naaman who was commanded to dip in the river Jordan seven times for the healing of his leprosy.

In part Rev. Dodson said, "These stories are told as a rebuke to those who are always seeking for the dramatic in religion, as against the lowly and humble spirit of service and helpfulness. The Cross and the Towel are significant emblems. The Cross represents the highest drama in the world, and the towel wherewith Jesus gird himself represents the lowliest service."

When the summer months are past Rev. Dodson will return to Yale Divinity School to further his studies.

Rev. C. F. McCall of the Congregational Church presided and announced the program. Mrs. Earl Downing presided at the organ and assisted with the song service. The Rev. Jas. A. Edgar gave the invocation, following the reading of the Scripture lesson by Dr. G. W. Bruce of the Methodist Church.
