Aboard a battleship in the Pacific—Clifford McLean, radarman, third class, USNR, whose wife, Margaret lives at 117 Almond st., Ashland, Ore., recently volunteered as a blood donor in event his blood is needed by injured or critically ill shipmates aboard this 35,000-ton man-o-war.

During the last 12 months, eight emergency blood transfusions have been made. For each pint of blood donated, the Navy pays \$25, a fact not known by most of the men who have volunteered.

Ashland Sergeant Decorated in Italy

With the Fifth Army, Italy—Sergeant Lemuel E. Miller, 468 "C" Street, Ashland, Oregon, recently was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in action in Italy.

He served on the Fifth Army front in the 362nd Infantry Regiment of the 91st "Powder River" Division.

The award citation related: "Miller volunteered to personally disarm new mines discovered by his platoon on September 10, 1944 on Highway 65 before the Sieve River. This new mine had both pull and pressure type fuzes. Considering the safety of the platoon, Miller moved forward, using a wire for a safety pin, disarmed 30 or 40 of the 50 pound mines. This courageous action at great risk of personal safety made possible the opening of Highway 65 for the assault companies," concluded the citation. His mother, Mrs. Mabel Miller listed at 468 "C" St., Ashland.

Waves Fill Many Important Positions

WAVES, observing their third anniversary July 30, fill 18 per cent of the shore jobs in the United States, directly serving the fleet and far-flung bases in the Pacific, the WAVES enlistment offices, 301 Exchange Bldg., Seattle, and 426 Park Bldg., Portland, announced today.

Although 86,000 WAVES are on duty, the Navy needs 2,000 more per month. Half the young women, who must be between the ages of 20 and 36, will go into the hospital corps. The others will serve as replacements at air stations, district headquarters, Navy yards and supply depots.

For the first time on a WAVE birthday, members of the Women's Reserve are overseas. Nearly 3700 enlisted women and 350 officers are in Hawaii. WAVES may go overseas after six months' duty in this country.

In three years, WAVES have taken over increased responsibilities in many fields. They handle about 80 per cent of the administration and supervision of the Navy mail service for the entire fleet. In "radio Washington," nerve center of the whole Navy communication system, WAVES fill 75 per cent of the jobs. At the Indian Head rocket powder plant, they operate the laboratory, firing bays and do ballistic calculations.

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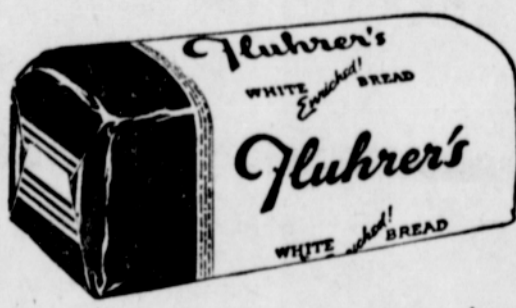
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
