The report is that these people suffer silently, without a word of complaint.

July Was Hotter

Than Average, Report Monthly report issued by the U. S. weather bureau at Medford showed that July of this year was some-what warmer than normal with a deficency of rainfall of .30 inches. Mean maximum temperature for the month was 92.5 degrees as compared with the average monthly mean maximum of 90.7 degrees. The monthly mean minimum was 55.8 degrees. This gives an average monthly average temperature of 74.2 degrees or 1.5 degrees above normal. The average lowest temperature for past years is 54.7 degrees.

No measureable precipitation fell at the bureau during the month, but rain from thunder storms fell in spotted areas of the valley on July 10 and 28. A trace of rain fell on the 18.

There were 25 clear days, four partly cloudy days and two cloudy days according to the report. With exception of the very
