

WHAT THE SCHOOLS SHOULD EXPECT OF THE PARENTS
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Teachers should not be excited by suggestions from a parent expected to take over the "raising" of the youngsters. The child is in the home many more hours than he is at school and nothing can take the place of good home training. Fortunate is the youngster who has had the advantage of a good home. Having learned to obey orders, respect authority, and to get along with others, he has a decided advantage over his less fortunate fellows in school.

The school should not be expected to provide all the recreational and social life for the students. The primary function of the school is education and care must be taken lest the "tail wag the dog." The school should cooperate with the church, youth groups and other organizations in carrying on a recreational program for the young people of Ashland.

Both the youngsters and the teacher "gets a break" when the student comes to school after a good full night's sleep, and a nourishing breakfast. No student

can do good work at school if he has not had his rest the night before and his right in this matter should always be respected. The healthy, well-nourished youngster is more apt to succeed than the one who is less fortunate. When a child is not well he should not be in school.

As far as possible, the school tries to expect a youngster to be normal with a happy outlook on life that comes from a home where there is a harmonious, cooperative experience.

L. R. Phillips Serves Aboard in Enterprise

L. R. Phillips, water tender, third class, OSN, Ashland, Ore., served aboard the famed Pacific Fleet aircraft ENTERPRISE, the "fighting carrier in the fleet," now back in the States for repairs after having been hit by a Jap suicide plane on May 14. The ENTERPRISE, whose record of battles dates back to Pearl Harbor, accounted for 911 Jap aircraft shot down by her planes and guns, and 71 ships sunk and 182 probably sunk by her planes during her 275,000 miles of war duty.

During the last two months of the Okinawa campaign, the ENTERPRISE was hit four times while protecting land troops from Jap air attacks. Twice she retired from Task Force 58, for repairs at a nearby base. Then, on May 14, this flagship of Vice Admiral Marc A. Mitscher, was hit by a Jap suicide plane. Fourteen members of the crew were killed and 34 wounded. In a record time of 17 minutes the valiant crew had the flames under control and 13 minutes later, the fires were completely out.

The history of the ENTERPRISE is the history of the Pacific war. The Japs claimed to have sunk her six times. She is the only carrier to have been awarded the Presidential Unit Citation.
