### Crater Lake Closed Because Early Snow

## Ashland Wins Grid Term Opener with Dunsmuir Friday

End Runs, Forward Passes And Line Plunges Bring Easy 42-0 Victory Over California Team

Before a small number of spectators Friday evening, the Ashland Grizzlies uncorked a dazzling array of end runs, forward passes, tricky plays, etc. to win the season's opener with Dunsmuir, with a final score of 42-0. The game, a pre-school game, opened promptly at eight o'clock at the Walter Phillips field with Gordon Peterson kicking the ball. In the opening minutes of the game, Ashland scored two touchdowns, making good on the extra point on the first but failing on the second, to make the score 13 to 0. Late in the first quarter, Coach Roberts seeing that the Grizzlies had a decided edge on their opponents, sent in the entire second string to let them get in a little work. Throughout the second quarter the reserves stayed in the game, but through several costly fumbles were pushed back into their own territory, to give the visitors their only scoring chance. Several of the first string boys were sent into bolster the flagging defenses and the visiting team was pushed back without being able to score. The ball was pushed to the Ashland 18 yard line, the nearest it ever got to scoring territory for the Dunsmuir boys.

The second half started with Dunsmuir kicking to Ashland. Through a series of passes, and runs, etc. Ashland was able to score in the third stanza. Here again the reserves took over and apparently nettled by the mauling they had taken earlier in the game, put on a fine show for the balance of the game, making several scores. The big thrill of the game came when fleet-footed Tad Gandeve raced eighty yards for a touchdown, with most of the Dunsmuir team chasing him, but unable to get their hands on him. The game ended with the score standing 42-0.

The Ashland boys, showed that they had received a lot of good instruction in broken field playing, forward passes, and end runs etc., looked like they had the stuff for a winning team.

One Eagle Award And Numerous Other Advancements, etc. Will Be Given Tues.

An eagle scout district court of honor for the Ashland district of Boy Scouts will be held Tuesday evening, Chairman Dick Trites announced this week. The meeting will be held in the Junior Civic Club house, beginning at 7:30, immediately following the regular Lions club meeting. Main feature of the Court of Honor will be the presentation to Ned Stanes of the Eagle award, the highest award to be earned in scouting, and one very seldom earned by any Boy Scout. Ned Starnes is a member of Troop 12 sponsored by the Lions club. Other awards, such as advancements in rank, merit badges, several star awards, etc will also be made to members of Troops 10, 12, 13, and 14, all of the Ashland district. Preliminary advancement work has been under way for some time in the various troop to prepare them for the district court.

In order that readers should know what it takes to become an Eagle scout a few of the things required are listed. A boy must pass through the tenderfoot, second and first class ratings. He then advances to the rank of star scout when he has completed the work necessary to secure five merit badges. This requires nearly a year in point of service. The next rank is on through life scout with its requirements and to reach the Eagle Scout rank he must have not less than 32 merit badges, evertime of which are on required subjects, such as life saving, first aid, etc. the balance of the thirty-two can be selected. Two years of active scouting is required to reach the Eagle scout rank. Lions club members will attend as a group and parents of the scouts and friends of the movement are asked and urged to attend.

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## THE S. P. RESTORES THROUGH PASSENGER SERVICE TO FRISCO

Southern Pacific today announced plans for restoration of through passenger service between San Francisco and Grants Pass, Oregon, via the Siskiyou Lines, to be put into effect as soon as ODT restrictions are lifted on the use of sleeping cars in runs of 450 miles or less.

All stations between Dunsmuir and Grants Pass, including Ashland and Medford, will be served, according to the announcement.

The San Francisco-Grants Pass through service was discontinued January 12, 1942, as part of Southern Pacific's widespread action in discontinuing 37 passenger trains over its system to make equipment and crews available for pressing war needs. Bus service was substituted on the run between Grants Pass and Dunsmuir.

## 3 Youths Jailed For Car Theft

State Police Officer and Deputy Sheriff Arrest Three At Prospect For Car Theft.

Last Wednesday Deputy Sheriff Vern Smith and state police officer Frank Dupray arrested George Frouse, aged 17 and Eugene Bellows, 21, for whom they held warrants on felony charges. The arrests were made at Prospect, early Wednesday morning before the two youths had gotten out of bed. At the time of the arrest a third member of the youthful trio, Vern Robertson, 22 was not at home, but later, while the officers were still at Prospect, he drove by at a high rate of speed. The two officers returned to Medford with the two whom they had arrested and placed them in the county jail and then returned to Prospect to renew the search for Robertson, in the vicinity of Prospect. The 1940 Oldsmobile coupe, found in possession of the boys was found by officers late Wednesday afternoon well hidden in the brush on a side road some miles from Prospect. It was thought Robertson was hidden out in the area and about 2 A. M. Thursday morning the officers located Robertson in a cabin in the vicinity of Flourence Rock. He was arrested and brought back to the county jail.

Warrants for the arrest of the youths were issued when it was discovered they were involved in the theft of the car, which had been driven through nine states before returning to Prospect. The youths were also charged with forgery and other deceptions.
