

The question of the C street extension has grown more bitter all this week and the question is being debated up and down Main street. To bring matters to a head a petition was circulated along Main street the fore part of the week and 'tis reported that some 40 signers, all business men, asked the city council to consider more deeply the question, to consult with some of the property owners affected should an extension be made, etc. and Tuesday was turned over to the council.

After hearing some of the arguments on both sides, we have come to the conclusion that not very many are in favor of such a move, that the city council acted hastily, and we might say, without much consideration of the other side. For there very definitely is another side in the argument and they have some very good arguments to advance too.

As we see the picture, such a street would certainly deprive the city of several choice spots for business buildings, torn down several years ago when the state wanted to put the Plaza project through. We note that there has been no taxes coming in off that property since then either. Placing another street in there at the point of intersection, would in our judgment, and others, make for a very congested traffic spot. The city would be put to a huge expense in securing the right of way for the extension, there is a 20 or so foot drop to go down to the level of the intersection, and personally we think it would make a mess of things.

The state highway department was all set to let bids on the 29th of this month to finish the Plaza project, but the council's action put an immediate stop to that, and they have called off asking for bids until the matter is settled. They are not in favor of the project and apparently have said so, in no uncertain language. Property owners along the property affected by the change have said so too, and in no uncertain language.

We are informed that the highway department a long time ago, surveyed a route for the highway completely passing outside Ashland, leaving the present highway this side of Jackson Hot Springs and returning to it in the Bellview district. Wouldn't that be a pretty kettle of fish, if they should decide to go ahead with that and forget the Plaza and the C street extension?

On the other side of the argument there is some need for additional building space, and perhaps C street is the spot, but there is nothing there now to prevent a building being placed on the space. It probably would be true that opening C street would force more traffic along that street.

Ashland Juniors Lead Grid League

Ashland junior high took the lead in the southern Oregon league with a slim 7 to 6 victory over Medford juniors. Riggs for Medford scored first in the opening quarter from Ashland 37 yd. line on a nicely run play over their own right tackle. Grizzly Grid Team Wins From Grants Pass Friday Eve

Win From Grants Pass Puts Ashland Back In Running in Conference

It was gloomy along the Rogue Saturday, after the Grants Pass team and apparently most of the townspeople invaded Ashland, fully determined to take the Grizzly scalp home to the Rogue, but in a 11-hour stand, Ashland overran the visitors to win 19 to 7 in one of the most thrilling games seen here in many a day and before one of the largest audiences assembled in Walter Phillips stadium. The win definitely puts Ashland back in conference running after losing a game to Klamath Falls. By the dopesters way of thinking Grants Pass was slightly favored to win Fridays tussle, inasmuch as they had taken their game with a win from Klamath Falls.

First quarter was scoreless for both teams. In the second stanza the Grizzlies worked the ball to the Grants Pass 6-yard line. A flat pass from Williams to Jandreau caught the Cavemen flat-footed and Jandreau clamy stepped over the goal line without a Caveman being anywhere near. The try for extra point failed.

Grants Pass then took over the ball, and took to the air with Eventon passing to Lutz good for 21 yards. Boyce threw another, which put the ball on the Ashland 32 yard line. A lateral pass was good for 14 yards more. Lutz sparkplug for the Cavemen, plow ed off tackle to the Ashland 11 yard line and Boyce added three more on a sneak. Lutz again took the ball to score on an off-tackle play. Roley place kicked for the extra point, which was good and placed the Cavemen out in front to the tune of 6 to 7. The balance of the half was uneventful. The third quarter neither side was able to cross the goal line and at the beginning of the final quarter the score still stood 6 to 7.

In the final quarter, Ashland was able to score after Jandreau had run a Caveman punt back to the visitor's 40 yard stripe. On the next play a pass from Williams to Mitchell left the receiver in the clear and he crossed the Caveman goal unmolested. The try for extra point was good and Ashland was again out in front with a score of 13-7. After receiving the ball again, the Cavemen attempted to take to the air with a passing attack but the locals were on to their plays. Lutz attempted to pass from the Caveman 30 yard line, but Merriman of Ashland grabbed the ball, and tore over the goal line for the third touchdown, a lead the visitors were unable to overcome. Jandreau place kicked for extra point, which was good, the game ended the score 19-7 for Ashland.

Grants Pass had come to Ashland fully determined to win. They had sent advance notice that townspeople would accompany the team to see them win, and had made reservations for that number. A large number of Ashland people also turned out to see the game. Between halves the Ashland twirlers put on an exhibition.

Dr. Walter Redford Resigns Presidency of Local College

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education announced Tuesday that Dr. Walter Redford president of the Southern Oregon College of Education here at Ashland, had resigned his position and that Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, head of the Science Department had been appointed to fill the position. Dr. Redford resigned after being president here for the past fourteen years. The new president will take over his duties January 1.

Dr. Stevenson, 41, was formerly Dean of Men and assistant professor of Science at Eastern Oregon College of Education at La-Grande, from 1929 to 1940. He has taught during summer sessions at Stanford University and San Jose, California State College. For two years he was a member of the Portland Extension center staff. He has served on the Oregon State Teachers Association curriculum, teacher of education and all state science committees and the State Textbook Commission and the Teacher Selection committee of Portland.

Teachers' Meeting as SOCE Nov. 1-2

The Southern Oregon College of Education is cooperating with Josephine and Jackson Counties in sponsoring an educational conference to be held at the Southern Oregon College of Education November 1 and 2. There will be approximately five hundred teachers in attendance.

A number of outstanding educators have been secured as speakers for both the general and the sectional meetings of the conference. Dr. Flora, former president of N.E.A., Dr. Lillian Gray, Associate Professor of Education at San Jose State College, Dr. Victor P. Morris, Dean of the School of Business Administration, University of Oregon, Mr. Rex Putnam, State Superintendent Instruction, Dr. Frank Parr, Executive Secretary of the Oregon State Teachers Association, and James Burgess, Superintendent of Schools, The Dalles, Oregon, have been secured as general speakers for the two-day session. Other specialists in education have been secured to handle the sectional meetings of the conference.

This conference, which was initiated by the Southern Oregon College of Education, has been an annual event for many years with an attendance of from five-hundred to a thousand teachers from the Southern Oregon counties.

The general meetings of the conference will be held in the Physical Education Building and the sectional meetings will be held in both the Physical Education Building and the Administration Building.

Ex-Soldier Dies After Laying Week Near Auto Crash

Car Goes Off Mineral Springs Road A Week Ago And Was Found Saturday

Orval Christenson, 31, recently discharged from the army, died Monday morning at the Camp White hospital, after being found in an unconscious condition Saturday lying by the Wreck of his car in the Buckhorn Mineral Springs canyon, south of Ashland. The car driven by Christenson had left the road and was found upside down in the creek 87 feet from the road bed.

Christenson was discovered by C. W. McGrew, an employe at Buckhorn Springs who was picking rocks from the road Saturday afternoon, when he saw the car in the canyon and upon investigation found the injured man lying some distance from the car.

Christenson had been discharged from the army about three weeks ago and was visiting with his cousin, George Christenson at Buckhorn Springs. He had borrowed the cousin's car to go to Klamath Falls to work. He was to have returned a week later and when he had not returned, Dr Herman Wexler of Buckhorn Springs went to Klamath to learn of Christenson's whereabouts.

C. M. Litwiller, deputy coroner of Jackson County, was called and took the injured man to the Camp White hospital. He was found to be suffering from bruises about the head and internal injuries. Exposure in the cold nights of the past week added to his other injuries, caused his death early Monday morning, Christenson's home was at Ada, Minn.
