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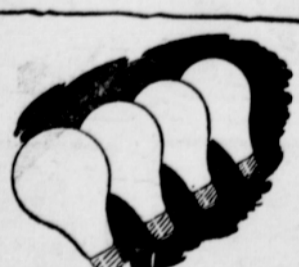

Second Youth for Christ Rally Sunday

Saturday at 7:30 P. M., the young people of Ashland will be making their way to the Second Youth-For-Christ Rally of the city, which will be held at the Baptist Church. The first of these rallies held two weeks ago, proved to be a great success. Almost 200 attended this meeting and most were young people, although it is understood that older people are not only invited but urged to attend.

The Youth-For-Christ rallies now being held in the 48 states of the union are the result of a spontaneous movement that has arisen amongst the young people themselves throughout the nation. It is however not a movement outside of the churches but rather within, and has the backing and endorsement of churches

from practically all of the evangelical denominations.

Rev. William Nagel of Portland, Oregon, representing the National Association of Evangelicals, will speak at the Rally held this Saturday. He is a former missionary of Europe and the Near East, where he worked before the outbreak of the present war. He is executive Secretary of the N.A.E. for the Pacific Northwest, which is an association of evangelicals representing over twenty denominations. Also Rev.
