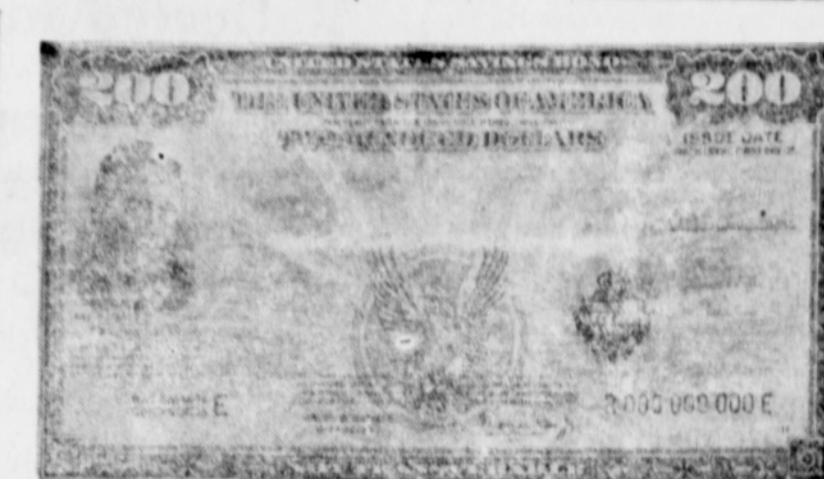
Herman B. Reese of Portland. Two low numbers were from Medford No. 2 going to M. L. Meadows and No. 12 going to Helen Bohl.

For example, to Los Angeles we are now operating 28 schedules each day, an improved frequency of service. There's a bus leaving just about any time you are ready to leave."

This improved Greyhound service, the bus executive pointed out, is only the first step in a program to provide this area with "finer highway transportation at lowest cost."

"Fares are now being lowered between many points," Mr. Ackerman said, "and still other reductions are contemplated."

Pacific Greyhound's expansion program, interrupted by the war, includes new buses, new and remodeled terminals, and other improved conveniences for bus travelers.
