Jewish Rabbi Speaks at SOCE Monday

Southern Oregon College of Education, Nov. 19—Rabbi Alexander Feinsilver of Sacramento, California, representing the Jewish Chautauqua Society, spoke at the Southern Oregon College of Education, Monday, November 19, on the subject "What we Jews believe." Rabbi Feinsilver discussed the historical quality of Judaism. He stated that originally the Jew were an ethnic class, but through modification of four thousand years of contact with various nations of peoples, the Jews have become merely a religious fellowship. He discussed also distinguishing tenets of three divisions of the Jewish faith, orthodox, conservative, reformed. He concluded by enumerating ten principles adhered to by the reformed group, which he himself represented.

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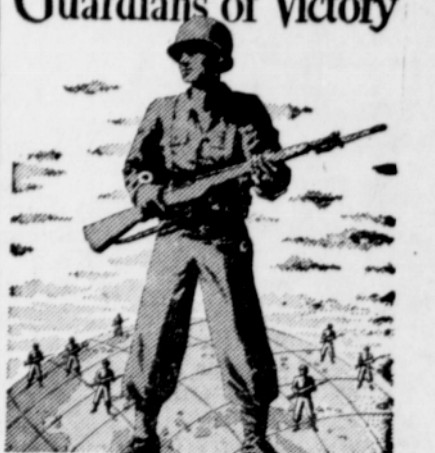
