

Letter to the Editor:

TO THE EDITOR:

Our Forefathers gave us a city charter as a guide to future city government. It provides safeguards. It provides for the general welfare, equal opportunity, repre-

sentative government through the three wards of our city.

In part the charter says to elect our mayor and councilmen every two years. They must live in their respective wards and be freeholders and legal voters. It is their duty to look after the interests of

said wards so that all parts of the city will grow in harmony and equal opportunity.

This city charter method is used in practically all other towns of the State. It is safe, honest and sincere. Now Mr. Editor let's take a look at what happened in 1928. An amendment was made to the city charter. It says in part to elect our mayor for four years and the three councilmen receiving the highest number of votes are deemed to be elected for four years and the other three candidates for councilmen receiving the next highest vote shall be deemed to be elected for a term of only two years.

It is the opinion of the writer that the above set-up is illegal. It is contrary to the spirit and meaning of municipal corporate law, initiative and referendum. The amendment elects a city government of special privilege. Safe guards provided in the city charter are ignored, the initiative and referendum law has been ignored and bypassed, ward lines have been abolished inimical to the general welfare of our people. It is "taxation without representation." Give to our citizens the same privileges as other cities enjoy—equal rights, equal opportunities, so that we can all progress and prosper together.

In my letter to the Editor some time ago I mentioned less city government as the council acts only in an advisory capacity, three councilmen, one from each ward with a mayor would be more efficient and representative of the whole city.

Oregon Cheese Output Is Up but Butter Down

Substantial increases in cheddar and cream cheese production in Oregon were recorded in the first half of 1945 but creamery butter output dropped 20 per cent over the first half of 1944, reports the state director of agriculture, E. L. Peterson, in referring to the Oregon manufactured dairy products figures covering this period. The report was compiled jointly by the federal and state departments of agriculture.

Butter output in the first half of 1945 was 10,445,000 pounds; cheddar cheese production was 13,885,000 pounds from whole milk and 223,000 pounds from part skim milk. Total make of cream, cottage and other cheeses was over a million pounds greater than in the first half of 1944. Nearly 25 million pounds of canned evaporated milk were handled for a new record. Sizable gains were made in the output of condensed milks and in dry whole milk while drops were recorded in non-fat dry milk solids and other dried products except whole milk.

Although there was a decrease of only 1.4 per cent in the total milk and cream received at dairy manufacturing plants, there was a large drop (from 17,507 in the first half of 1944 to 13,890 in that period in 1945) in the average number of patrons delivering cream to Oregon plants. The number delivering whole milk was down slightly and averaged 11,070 patrons.
