Weather Cause of Many Accidents

Adverse weather conditions figured prominently in traffic accidents reported in Oregon during the month of November, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., said today.

There were four fatal accidents

as a result of skidding, caused by speed too great for the slippery road surfaces, Farrell said. Seven pedestrians were struck and killed by cars during rainy weather, most of these accidents occurring during hours of darkness. Two fatal accidents occurred when driver, blinded by glaring lights in rain storms, failed to see hazards in the highway.

"The combination of slippery road surfaces and limited visibility occurs frequently in this state during winter months," the Secretary of State pointed out. "Under that combination of circumstances, the addition of speed is a dangerous thing. Drivers are likely to find themselves in emergencies as a result of slippery roads or limited visibility, and then find themselves unable to stop in time, due to their speed."

Farrell urged drivers to give consideration to the hazards of slippery road surfaces and limited visibility during winter months, and to regulate their speed accordingly in the interest of avoiding accidents.
