Crater Lake May Open On June 15

June 15, the date originally set for opening of Crater Lake National park, is still the target date. E. P. Leavitt, park superintendent said this week.

Snowplows are now one and one half miles from the rim of the crater and are encountering snowdrifts 12 feet in depth. A one way road for use of park service employees has been carved into the park headquarters.

The Crater Lake park hotel which was not operated during the war will open this year but it is not certain whether it will be open for business on the June 15 date.

The snowplow has been working for 30 days in a two shift schedule. When the rim is reached there will be a three quarter mile stretch of roadway that is covered with 20 feet of snow. At present a Sno cat is being used to haul men and equipment into the Park headquarters.

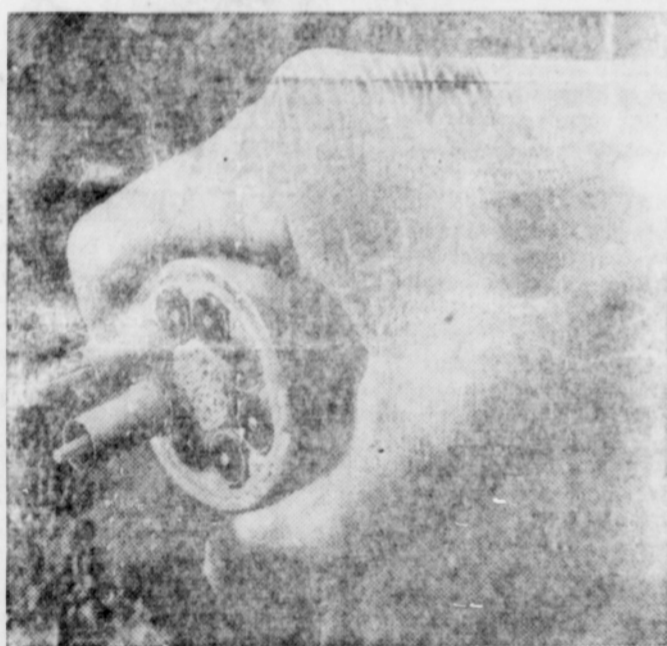

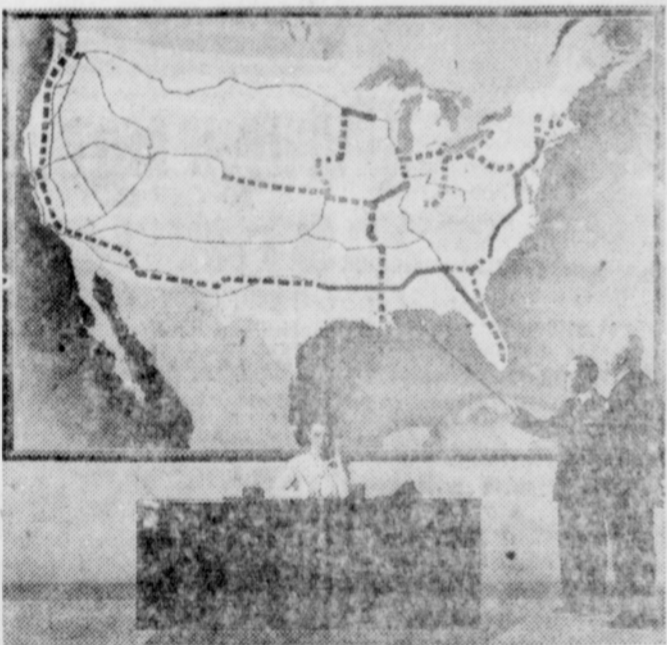
