Funeral services for John R. Norris, well known resident of Jacksonville who passed away at his home Thursday, June 20, were held at the Conger-Morris chapel 10:00 A. M. Monday, June 24, with the Reverend Harry Hansen officiating.

Mr. Norris was born February 16. 1877 at Wautuaga County, North Carolina. He came to Oregon in 1904 where he has since been connected with the fruit and logging industry. He was foreman for several orchards and grew a crop of Winter Nellis pears on the Midvalle orchard on the Jacksonville highway that won the gold medal at the San Francisco Exposition in 1915.

He has been a member of Jacksonville IOOF lodge No. 10 for forty years and held many offices of distinction in all branches of the order.
