Airport Gets Federal Aid On the airport issue the Federal government will match the cities money with a contribution of 25% on the cost of the site and 50% on the cost of development. The amendment which will be placed before the voters will au-thorize the mayor and council to revenue from the airport operation will go. It further provides that the council be empowered each year to include in the annual tax levy a sum equal to and not to exceed two mills on each property for the maintenance of Lions Consider airport's sinking fund.
