Radio Station Awaits FCC Ok To Broadcast

WILL BEGIN OPERATIONS AT
MOMENT TELEGRAM COMES

KWIN personnel anxiously awaited word to go on the air from the Federal Communications Commission as they continued testing throughout this week.

With facilities, programs and personnel all keyed up and awaiting the OK telegram, Roy Peck, station manager stated that the minute the Rogue Valley Broadcasting Co. Inc. got the telegram that programs would begin.

Listeners in the Ashland area who have been hearing the tests nightly, are also anxiously waiting the opening of the broadcasting. Operating on 1400 kilocycles, 250 watts amplitude modulation the station will serve Ashland and surrounding area.

Open house will take place September 1.

The Bonneville Power administration is a public works project designed to create electrical power for the portion of the North West which is not reached by the Coulee Dam project.

Carter Monument A Plaza Landmark

An early pioneer, with his buckskin shirt and powder horn, jackboots and long rifle, surmounts the drinking fountain in the Plaza, shading his iron eyes with an iron hand, as he peers eastward. He was intended to be looking west but Main Street runs east from the Plaza, so, in order to face the town, he looks east.

This monument was presented to the city by the estate of Har-



riette Hine Carter and Henry Beach Carter, early settlers of Ashland.

Harriette and Henry Carter came to Ashland from Elkader, Iowa and with the son, Ernest V. Carter started the first bank here in May 1884.

After both Mr. and Mrs. Carter died their children and grandchildren decided to donate this monument to the city and dedicate it to them.

Mr. and Mrs. Carter have three grandsons living in this vicinity, they are H. C. Galey of Ashland, George R. Carter, County Clerk in Medford, Henry B. Carter, twin brother of George R. of Crescent City, California. Also Mrs. E. V. Carter, wife of Ernest Carter lives in Ashland.

Joe Martin, Drummer Man Plays Here This Monday

Joe Martin, who appears at the Ashland Armory on Monday, July 29, under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce is a born showman; although a young man in years he has appeared before the public in various roles for twenty of his twenty-eight years.

Joe started his career as a dancer before his eighth birthday. He was featured in stage shows in the leading theatres of his native Texas as a child prodigy, but his earliest ambition was to become a drummer and lead his own band.

Despite success as a featured act for Fanchon & Marco Stage Units on Fox West Coast Theatre Tours, Joe, after appearing as a dancer in Billy Rose's Casa Manana in Fort Worth in 1937, quit dancing and took up drums professionally. As a drummer he played with Jimmie Greer, Bob Chester, Bob Zuroke, Harry Owens, Joe Reichman, Joe Venuti, Peak Kelley, Ozzie Nelson and others. From each leader he learned the style associated with that particular band and became adept not only as a swing drummer, but also in Hawaiian, Latin, society and hotel types of rhythms. Joe felt that a band must be versatile and must be sufficiently diversified in its offerings to please all audiences.

Residents of Ashland will go to the polls at the Library and the City Hall on Tuesday, July 30 to vote on the proposed \$750,000 bond issue for a more adequate city water supply and on a \$50,000 bond issue for a proposed airport.

The two separate amendments will be known on the amended charter as Article XXXII and Article XXXIII. Voters will 100 yes or 101 no on the water question and will vote 103 yes or 104 no on the airport.

Roads In Forests Closed To Travel

Several areas throughout the Rogue river national forest have been temporarily closed to travel according to Karl L. Janouch, Forest Supervisor.

The reason for the closures is to prevent the possibility of fires where logging operations are in action. Permits to enter will be issued to those having business, such as logging, grazing or mining.

The Ashland creek watershed is closed but the Ashland loop road thru the area remains open, so that it is possible to travel over the loop from Ashland to the Applegate district and back to Medford. It is not permissible to leave the road between the city of Ashland and the summit of Ashland mountain.
