THE TWAIN MEETS—IN RECORD-BREAKING TIME!—A new east-west speed record was set by this new Navy Neptune patrol bomber, a two-engine Lockheed P-3V, when it set down at Burbank Field, Calif., 3 hours 22 minutes and 2 seconds after its take-off from Floyd Bennett Field. This sliced 12 minutes off the previous best speed, despite poor flying conditions that forced the plane 100 miles off course. The Neptune was piloted by Commander Thomas D. Davies, of Chevy Chase, Md., and carried three naval crewmen and two civilian passengers.
