KWIN went on the air Tuesday afternoon within a few minutes after receiving word from the Federal Communications Commission.

Selby Chevrolet Company was the first sponsored program to be broadcast Wednesday morning.

## A Statue Honors Jacob Thompson

The statue was presented as a monument to Jacob Thompson, stepfather of Mr. Butler, who landed in Portland in 1847. No more fitting monument could have been erected to the men who came west in search of a new life than the statue of the Great Emancipator. In his hand he holds a scroll symbolizing his great love of truth and freedom. The monument was carved in Italy by an Italian sculptor, Frille, and cost \$950.00, at that time.
