#### MEMBERS OF CHURCH TO CONTINUE TO MEET

Three fires started in separate places in the Church of Christ at Second and C streets by pyromania-minded children were the cause of a fire which burned the building to the ground Wednes-

day afternoon. One child, Jack Hall, 4, who was trapped in the belfry of the church was saved by Fire Chief Clint Baughman. The little boy was uninjured but was unable to tell who had set the fire other than to say that it was a boy who rode a blue bicycle and who weighed about 50 pounds. Firemen were preparing to run

hoses into the attic of the build-ing when the Hall child was seen by spectators at the window of the minister's study which is in the belfry. Ladders were rushed to the window and Baughman broke out the glass and lifted the frightened child to safety.

The Hall child told how the other boy had set a robe on fire in the choir loft, and of another fire which was started near the front of the church. Firemen found matches and paper scattered near a side entrance, indicating plans to start a third fire.

Frank Hall, father of the child. is an edger for Robin and Gordon Civic Club house, according to and arrived home after the fire had burned itself out. Mrs. Hall was in Medford, and the four year old boy was being taken care of by his older sister.

Fire Chief Baughman and the city police department are tracking down leads in an attempt to discover the other boy or boys

The children gained entry into the church through the front door which always has been unlocked.

Loss to Exceed \$30,000 Fire Chief Baughman in looking at the ruins, said that the loss would well exceed \$30,000. Insurance on the building and the contents amounts to \$12,000. The building was completely gutted by the fire which worked from the upper stories downward.

The church was 47 years old, the rear addition had been made, however, in 1924. During the past five years the entire auditorium had been remodeled. ceiling had been added and other work had been completed. The church was clear of all indebted-
