### Donaugh Visits Local Democrats

Carl Donaugh, Democratic candidate for governor, met with Ashland Democrats at the Lithia Hotel Wednesday morning.

Mr. Donaugh who has been stumping the state for the past two weeks by air, bus and private car plans to go to LaGrande and Baker Thursday.

Donaugh has been U. S. Attorney for Oregon for the past twelve and a half years and was longer in that capacity than anyone in the state. He was candidate for democratic senator in 1938. From 1930 to 1934 he was democratic state chairman and during that time he handled Roosevelt's campaign for presidency.

He goes on record as supporting the Basic school fund support bill and says if he is elected will appoint new members of the Oregon State Liquor Commission.

### Service on Sunday For Willing Hearts

The Building Finance committee of the Church of Christ announces that gifts and pledges for the construction of a new building to replace the one recently destroyed by fire will be received at a special Willing Hearts service next Sunday morning. The service will be held at the Junior High school auditorium at the regular eleven o'clock service.

The committee states, "That while it is difficult to make estimates with accuracy, it is believed that \$40,000 will be needed to construct the first wing of the proposed building." The church now has \$14,000 on hand for construction purposes. This leaves \$26,000 to be raised. "This is a large sum for our people," states Earl F. Downing, minister of the church, "but we believe that we can make a sizeable impression on it next Sunday."

Prizes will be awarded for the best decorated windows Friday afternoon.

Saturday the childrens parade will form at the Junior high school at 2:00 p.m. Contestants should arrive at the assembly point between 1:00 and 1:30 p.m. The parade will be led by the Motor Police, the Flag, majorettes and the High School band. The bicycle section will then follow with clowns and costumed characters, the pet division, Bliss Heines drum and bugle corps, wagon and buggies, and saddle ponies, parading in that order. Prizes of \$5.00, \$3.00, and \$1.00 are to be awarded to the best three contestants in each division.

The new secretary did his college work at Des Moines College in Iowa. He started his Y work in Des Moines and left there to become the secretary in charge of the boys work in Burlington, Illinois. He held similar positions in LaCross, Wisconsin and Spokane, Washington. When the war broke out he went back to New York for special training in U.S.O. work and has been following this type of work since. He will finish his work in Port Townsend and take over his new duties in Ashland within a month.

### CPA Halts Work On Two Buildings

A representative of the CPA this week notified Dave Whittle of Whittle Transfer and Fuel Company and George E. Miller that they would have to stop work on their new building projects.

Whittle was building a new storage warehouse on Fourth st. and he was told that it was not because of lack of materials that his project was stopped but because his building had not been classified as essential at this time.

According to Whittle he had been uninformed concerning the need for a permit for buildings costing over \$400, and had bought non priority materials for building in the open market. The CPA representative told Whittle that the buying of the materials was not in violation of CPA controls but that the use of them was. Whittle is planning to get the proper permit as soon as is possible.

Millers new restaurant location at Second and East Main street was halted for the same reason.

The JWV store, at the entrance to Lithia Park, Claycomb building and George Knox's building on the Plaza were all passed. According to J. V. Weitzel, his building was passed by the CPA representative because it was begun before March 1st. George Knox will use the second floor of his building for apartments and it therefore was declared essential.

Materials for the Claycomb building have already been purchased and it is near completion so it was okayed.

Many other construction jobs were inspected by the Civilian Production Administration, while the examiners were here.

### Registration To Close October 5th

Registration for voters who will vote in this years general election will close Saturday at 7:30 according to Nelle Burns city registrar. Mrs. Burns' office is located at 15 North Main.

The bi-election will be held November 5 and registration closes on October 5, 30 days before. Mrs. Burns suggests that Ashland residents who have not already registered do so at once. So far 112 people have registered since the 24 of July. Thirty of this total were registered Saturday and Sunday of this last week.

Persons required to register include those who have moved out of their precinct since the last election, women who have changed their names by marriage, persons who have reached 21 since the last election, those who failed to vote two years ago, those who will have established a six month residence in the state on or before election day and not already registered, and newly naturalized citizens. Veterans are advised to check with the registrar to see if their names are on the books.
