Registration for voters who will vote in this years general election will close Saturday at 7:30 according to Nelle Burns city registrar. Mrs. Burn's office is located at 15 North Main.

The bi-election will be held November 5 and registration closes on October 5, 30 days before. Mrs. Burns suggests that Ashland residents who have not already registered do so at once.
