John Nosler to Present Plan For Revolving Fund

Will Speak At Tuesday
Meeting of Chamber of
Commerce On New Idea

John Nosler, candidate for city councilman, will be the speaker at the noon meeting of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce according to an announcement by William Healy executive secretary of the chamber. Bob Ingie will act as chairman of the meeting which will be held at the Lathia coffee shop.

Nosler will present his proposed Community Revolving fund which he says will combine the best features of a Community Chest with those of a permanent finance fund for community service groups. The plan also offers a means of having a complete community recreational program.

Dr. Walter W. Weller, president of the Chamber of Commerce had asked Nosler to make a study of a program which would serve the dual purpose of eliminating countless solicitation campaigns for funds and would also permit the setting up of a program of community recreation.

At the meeting next Tuesday Nosler will point out the disadvantages of individual organizations doing their own soliciting and will also explain how some communities have attempted to overcome these disadvantages with the Community Chest program.

According to the studies which Nosler has made the drawbacks of the Community Chest are that the organizations concerned request from the Chest budget, a total allotment in round numbers which is higher than what they really need. Money which is overallocated to these organizations is never returned to the Community Chest.

NOT A COMMUNITY CHEST

The community revolving fund as Nosler will explain it Tuesday will alleviate this difficulty. The fund will be administered by trustees appointed by the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce. These trustees will be authorized to accept gifts and donations and will also allocate monies to various community organizations which need a specific amount for operating expenses.

Once a year a campaign will be put on to raise money for the needs of the fund, the city will also be asked to contribute to the fund all monies now received for recreational purposes. Other money will be forthcoming from sporting events which would be put on under the community recreational program which is a part of the fund.

The revolving fund will be an essential part of a community recreation program. National authorities, according to Nosler, have recommended that such programs be supported by communities and be conducted by trained leaders. The fund will provide for this.

Receipts from playoffs of sports events staged under the recreational program could make the fund nearly self-supporting.

Healy, who had conferred with Frank Hull, manager of the Jackson county fair, stated that Hull had endorsed the plan on the basis that Medford was rapidly becoming the industrial center of Jackson county and that Ashland was as rapidly becoming the hub of the agricultural area.

Mayor Thornton Wiley, prominent orchardist, is also strongly behind the idea and will work with the Chamber of Commerce to bring the fair to Ashland; Wiley said that he would appear before the county court and point out the advantages inherent in having the fair in Ashland.

The possibilities of Ashland as the center of the Jackson county fair were indicated by the Harvest Festival, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce which was held here two weeks ago. Herb Fischborn, chairman of the Festival, pointed out in his recommendations the fact that the Festival had shown the possibilities of Ashland as a Fair center. Lathia Park, which is widely used by farm folks throughout the county as a picnic ground, would be a valuable adjunct and a drawing card for the Fair, Fischborn stated.

John Daugherty, president of the Ashland Riding Association, stated that he felt sure that the members of the association would co-operate fully in any way they could to bring the fair to Ashland.

Members of the Chamber of Commerce, the city council, the Riding Association and other local groups will meet with the county court and other county officials to point out the advantages of having the fair in Ashland.

There has been no Jackson County Fair for several years and the fairgrounds and the buildings which are on the outskirts of Medford are presently in a run-down condition. They are also under lease by the United States Army which precludes their use.
