E. E. Vail States Ashland To Get New Post Office

**SITE NOT DESIGNATED
FOR \$95,000 BUILDING**

Federal postal agencies announced this week that when construction of Federal buildings was resumed the Ashland Post office was one of the first on the list of construction jobs.

Twelve new post offices were approved for Oregon, including one at Central Point, and one to replace the 55 year old Ashland postoffice.

E. E. Vail, postmaster, stated that no particular site has been designated when federal construction is again resumed a \$95,000 structure will be built.

Vail expects that a government building inspector will visit Ashland in the near future, and further information may be available at that time.

The Ashland postoffice was designated a first class postoffice July 1, 1945. In 1945 the postoffice did a \$48,000 business.

State's Jayvees Here On Saturday

Oregon State's Junior Varsity football team, undefeated in two starts, will meet Al Simpson's Southern Oregon college football team, which has been undefeated in three starts, here at Walter Phillips field this Saturday at 8:00 p.m.

The Southern Oregon college club decisively defeated Monmouth 53 to 0 in the Raiders first home appearance last Saturday. This was the first college game which Ashland fans had seen for eight years.

Previously this year the Southern Oregon team had won over Humboldt State and Chico State teachers.

The pre-game dope from the camp of the Beavers indicates that Coach Al Cox's youngsters have been displaying the same facility of making easy touchdowns. They rolled over Eastern Oregon College of Education 34 to 0 and beat the University of Oregon Jayvees, 48 to 6.

In the University of Oregon game the Beaver squad piled up five touchdowns in the second quarter to make a new Bell field point scoring record.

Both teams follow the theory that a wide open brand of football is best, and from the view point of the fans it is.

Dr. L. Sumerlin Dies Out Hunting

Dr. L. L. Sumerlin, prominent Ashland dentist, passed away last night while on a hunting trip near Bly Oregon. The message was phoned to Ashland this morning by his nephew, Leslie Barklow, who was in the hunting party with Dr. Sumerlin. It is understood that heart trouble was the cause of his death.

Dr. Sumerlin and his family moved to Ashland in November 1941 and practiced here with offices in the Swendenburg building. For the last two years he has had his office in Medford although still living in his residence on Granite Street. In the five years that he has lived in this community he has made a host of friends who will be shocked at his passing. Dr. Sumerlin was an Elk and while working in Ashland was active in the local Rotary Club, having been a charter member of this organization at Myrtle Point Oregon.

He was born at Lee, Coos County Oregon on Sept. 19, 1887. His parents were pioneers in that section and the family was prominent in Coos county since settling there. Dr. Sumerlin was graduated from the high school at Myrtle Point and attended the University of Oregon prior to his graduation from North Pacific Dental College. On April 26, 1922 he was married to Irma Bunch, daughter of W. H. Bunch, for many years Superintendent of Coos County schools. To this marriage was born Lavonne, Mrs. Phillip Lindsay and Richard who are students at Southern Oregon College and Ashland Senior High.

For a period of years Dr. Sumerlin was in Alaska and stories of his experiences there were of much interest to his friends. He leaves beside his family, three brothers: Tom of Myrtle Point, Cleve of Old Town Florida and Grade of Coos Bay.

STREET SIGNS ARE EN ROUTE; GOLF COURSE LEASE NOT YET SIGNED

Street signs, a new combination power shovel and ditch digger, and a street flusher, are presently in the process of being obtained in the near future by the City of Ashland according to a report made at city council Tuesday by Elmer Biegel.

The luminous street signs will be replaced as soon as they arrive. Invoices have already been received on them. A total of 5558 will be erected.

The shovel will be used in street and sewer construction operations. The flusher will be utilized to clean the streets.

Six and one-half miles of sewer lines have been laid and this extending of sewers will continue throughout the winter.

Two and one-half miles of streets were paved this summer and this work will begin again in the spring.

Three steel arches have been placed over Ashland Creek. One, a 14 foot span, at Hersey street, and two 11-foot spans on Water street. Nevada street is in line for a 14-foot span.

At present the city is asking for bids on a 28-foot concrete extension of the bridge where Winburn Way enters the Plaza.

Biegel also described improvements to the hospital which includes flooring, painting, and the building of new stairs in various portions of the building.

The lease which would turn the golf course over to the Chamber of Commerce was presented at the Tuesday night meeting but was not signed because of a policy of not signing any legal document in the absence of the city attorney, Wm. Briggs, who was not present at the meeting.
