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Bishop Suggests Pear Bowl Game

Suggesting that Ashland should have a Pear Bowl and emphasize recreational advantages and athletics, Harold Bishop, director of physical education at Southern Oregon college, told members of the Chamber of Commerce at the Tuesday luncheon that SOC was already making plans for a Thanksgiving game with an out-of-state football team.

"Already your city manager, Elmer Biegel, is making a plan of a potential stadium which could be carved out of the hill behind the college," Bishop said. "We'd like to call this the Pear Bowl and have a post season game there for Southern Oregon sport fans."

He pointed out that it would mean much in the way of favorable publicity for Ashland if this plan were carried out.

Bishop's suggestion was heartily endorsed by Bert Kimsey, who had previously recommended the same thing to Wm. Healy, secretary of the chamber of commerce.

E. E. Vail will preside at next Tuesday's meeting of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, according to Dr. W. W. Weller, president of the organization. The program has not yet been announced for the luncheon meeting.

At the meeting held last Tuesday members and guests were treated to venison steaks which were furnished by Don O'Blennes.

SONS Out to Make It Five Straight

Friday night at 8:00 o'clock on the Medford high school field Coach Al Simpson's sons of Southern Oregon college will meet the University of Oregon Junior varsity.

So far this season the Sons have played four and won four. Their last win took place in Ashland Saturday night when they defeated a bone crushing Oregon State Jayvee team, 9 to 7, in a thrill packed game that kept spectators on their toes throughout the entire four quarters.

In winning over Chico state, Humboldt state, Oregon College of Education, and the OSC Jayvees, the Sons have chalked up a total of 96 points. The four opponents have gathered but 14 points.

A light line consisting of Stan Smith, Clyde Eblevins, Gene Farthing, Gordon Peterson, Dick Skow, Tex Gatlin, and Jerry Edwards have been able to hold heavier lines throughout the season.

Eblevins, however, injured his leg in last week's game and is probably out for the rest of the season.

The backfield has quite consistently included Chuck Jandreau, Snuffy Smith, John Gray, Chuck De Autremont and Barney Riggs. Coach John Warren's Oregon Jayvee club will be packed with a powerhouse roster of players three deep in each position.
