Fire Department Gets New Truck

Ashland Fire Department's new fire truck will be ready for any emergency Friday morning according to Clint Baughman, fire chief.

The truck arrived from the factory the forepart of this week and is presently in a garage being serviced for operation. It was manufactured by the Ford Motor company and has a Mercury motor. The body was designed and built by the Howard Cooper corporation.

The truck is a combination pumper, water tank, and hose wagon, built particularly for use in communities which have the same type fire problems as Ashland. Main items of equipment is a 500 gallon Seagrave centrifugal pump. A 200 gallon booster tank is also part of the truck. It will carry 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 150 feet of 3/4 inch hose.

The small truck which the new truck replaces will not be discarded. It will be used for brush fires and fire control work. Baughman, fire chief has a staff of three men, John Kiel, Neal Heard and Harry McNair.

Pre-Registration Now At S. O. C.

Pre-registration for Southern Oregon College students who will attend the Winter Term is now under way. Seniors will register on Dec. 3, veterans on Dec. 4 and 5, other students on Dec. 6. This means that when winter term opens veterans need not return until Jan 3 to attend the beginning of classes. Other students will have to be on hand on Jan. 2 to pay their fees.

Opportunity for new students is open at Southern Oregon College for the winter quarter. Housing for 65 to 100 men will be available, and additional housing for women can be obtained. The college will have a full schedule of courses for those who are beginning or transferring. Registration for both old and new students will take place from Jan. 2 to Jan 18. New courses which will be presented this winter include: Print, clay modeling, clothing construction and selection, all offered by Assistant Professor

Ady; personal and family relations, Assistant Professor Messenger; Human physiology, Mr. Bishop; social dancing for men and women, Miss Stockham; oral interpretation, advanced speech and advanced journalism, Mr. Mulling; salesmanship; contemporary literature, Mr. Kreisman. Late evening courses which will be available to townspeople as well as students include continuations of Assistant Professor Bowmer's Shakespeare course and Dr. Elliott's course in contemporary problems. In addition, President Stevenson will present a course in Boy Scout Leadership on Monday evenings at seven o'clock.

Special Saturday morning classes for teachers in the county will be held with Assistant Professor Wilda offering Oregon School Law and Dr. Taylor offering Oregon History.
