Services for Frank Culp Held Tuesday

Funeral services, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge, were held Tuesday afternoon, December 10, 1:30 p.m. at the Masonic Temple for John Frank Culp. The Reverend George W. Bruce of the Methodist church delivered the sermon.

Culp died very suddenly early Friday morning, December 6, at the Community hospital, after being there only one day. He had lived in Ashland for the past eight years and was proprietor of the Culp Motor company, local Ford agency. Culp was active in the Elks lodge, Rotary club, was a director of the Ashland Chamber of Commerce, and in the Masonic order.

The deceased was born at Albany, Missouri, August 25, 1907, and is survived by his wife, Margaret Culp and two children, Carol and John; his mother, Mrs. Emma Culp; a sister, Mrs. C. E. Swanson, of La Crescenta, California; and an aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Bentley, of Montrose, California.

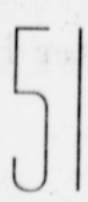
