Two Local Mills Buy Sale Timber

Cal-Ore lumber company and Fir Milling and Planing company of Ashland were included among the four successful bidders at an Oregon and California Lands administration timber sale held in Portland, January 7. E. K. Peterson, district forester reported this week.

John and McGrew brothers, Medford, and Timber Products, Medford, were the other two successful bidders. The four companies bought a total of 16,200,000 board feet of douglas and white fir, sugar and ponderosa pine, and incense cedar located in four different areas in Jackson county. Total sale price was \$123,300 an acre.

Fir Milling and Planing's bid on the incense cedar was \$4.12 per thousand board feet, and on the white fir, \$4.87 per thousand. Cal Ore received the ponderosa pine with a bid of \$10.25 per thousand feet.

Lincoln School To Hold Open House This Friday

Extensive work has been done on the building since the fire which occurred early in the morning on August 27. The school has an entire new aluminum sheath roof as two-thirds of the old was destroyed. All the classrooms and corridors have been acoustically treated with a new asbestos product which absorbs much of the noise. This same material acts as insulation and is itself fireproof.

The lighting of the second floor was greatly increased as part of the repair program and the old window shades were replaced by the type that will let in light from either the top or the bottom sash.
