New Pipeline Is Completed This Week

Mrs. H. A. Bernston, city recorder for Jacksonville, reports that the recent completion of a pipeline from the reservoir at the edge of town to the tunnel that furnished the city's water supply has given Jacksonville fresher and purer water.

This new pipeline by-passes the open reservoir in Jacksonville, and if it is ever necessary to use the reservoir in an emergency chlorination equipment has been procured. A large number of property owners in Jacksonville have asked for city water service but the city has not been able to furnish same because of a lack of funds. S. C. Watkins of Harvey and Assoc. is investigating means by which the facilities may be added and assessed against the property involved.
