Proceeds from membership fees for "SODA" are to be used in a scientific survey to determine what industries can function best in this area and to induce industries into the Southern Oregon re-

Healy pointed out that the in-dustrial development of the area had been of the type which produced a slack season during the winter months and that the unemployment curve rose sharply each winter.
