There is probably not a person alive, excepting the morbid of mind, who, after causing the death of another, can view the matter casually. The most hardened individual may be persecuted for months on end after a fatal accident, and a normally law-abiding citizen may have the entire pattern of his life changed, after causing the death of another.

Of course there is probably not a one of us, but who has his pet theory for the curtailment, if not the complete prevention, of our present astounding auto death rate. Some of these ideas would include such radical methods as disposing of all gasoline driven vehicles to the junk pile and returning to the good old horse and buggy days. As much as some of us would like to do that very thing, I suppose we ought to admit that we have generally made our lives too complicated to go to that extreme now.

One could theorize by the hour, but your correspondent believes that there is no operational changes to be made in vehicles other than that which the drivers of those vehicles may make. It would add up, it seems to me, to just what each of us make of our daily driving. Some of us religiously stop at all STOP signs, yet invariably drive 10 to 15 miles faster than the indicated speed in certain posted areas.

Others will adhere ceremoniously to the time limit on certain parking areas, yet will consistently pull away from the curb without as much as glancing into the rear view mirror, or turning the head about and giving the hand signal as the law requires.

And so one might go on and on listing the common and daily law infractions and general discourtecies of average driver. If only in some way the man behind the wheel could be made to always think about this question: "how would I feel if I was responsible for the death of some-
