S.O.C. LEADS STATE IN ENROLLMENT INCREASES

A table of enrollment figures for all institutions of the State System of Higher Education just released by the Office of the Chancellor reveals that Southern Oregon College leads the system in the percentage of its enroliment increase for the terms of 1946-1947 over 1945-1946. SOC increases for the Fall, Winter and Spring terms respectively were 610%, 239% and 129% as compared to increases for the entire system of 127%, 86% and 64% This up surge is erpected to continue for the 1947-1948 school
