Poling places will be open from eight o'clock in the morning to eight o'clock in the evening. Residents of the first ward of the city of Ashland will vote at the City hall. Residents of the second ward will vote at the Ashland Public library. The people of the Bellview district will vote at the Ashland Real Estate office which is located on Pacific Highway No. 99 between Normal
