Voting on the annexation of Beliview to the city of Ashland will take place Friday, June 20,, with poling places open from eight o'clock in the morning to eight o'clock in the evening.

I'wo groups of voters within the Beliview district, one headed by W. W. McMinn, and the other by Albert C. Joy, have crossed swords on the annexation. Micminn heads the committee for the opposition and Joy the committee for the annexation.

This week Joy stated that his group felt that by now the people concerned understood that Ashland's water supply would be but little affected. At present there are between 35 and 40 nomes, auto courts, and places of business within the area to be annexed, and Joy pointed out that to the best of his knowledge all but five of these places are now using city water for domestic purposes.

Within the last two or three years," Joy continued, "around 20 new homes have been built in this district.

'If this measure carried Dexter Woodworth, George Licks, Dick Joy, and Raymond Foster plan to carry on the development already underway.

Joy urged that Ashland voters visit the polls and vote yes for the Bellview annexation, he further pointed out that the added revenue from the sale of public utilities together with the added wealth and productivity which the district will bring to Ashland should benefit both the city proper and the district which is up for annexation.

McMinn Heads Opposition W. W. McMinn who heads the group in the Bellview area which opposes the annexation has point-ed out that farmers and livestock owners in the area are afraid that their means of livelihood would be disturbed by the annexation.
