The judging will take place at 8:00 p. m., July 4, on the Shakespearean stage in Lathia park. S.O.C. SUMMER SESSION

Thursday evening a style show and preview will officially usher in the opening of Weitzel's department store, at the corner of Lathia Park and Winburn way. The store will open for actual business Friday morning, June 27, Jake Weitzel, owner announced today.

"Alice of California" clothes will be modeled during the style show by professional San Francisco models and by local girls.

The store which was designed by Howard Perrine, Klamath Falls architect, is one of the most modern on the Pacific coast. The store front is done in cararra glass with a green undertone. Rounded plate glass show windows complete the modernistic touch. Along the south side of the building are small show ports, flush windows which are used for individual items of display.

Three entry ways provide adequate means of entering and leaving the store. The interior of the store is finished in plaster with fluorescent lighting fixtures, which cast indirect light. Store islands and display counters are of white birch.

Eighteen departments make up the store's merchandise selection. These are ladies ready-to-wear, men's wear, fabrics and patterns, sweaters and blouses, baby goods, lingerie, hosiery, cosmetics, candy, stationery, jewelry, ceramics, Heisey and Westmoreland glass, dinnerware, radio sales and service, household goods, electric appliances, and a model kitchen.

The basement of the store will be completed in a short time. Weitzel stated today, and it will be used to merchandise variety goods and bargain basement selections.

The second story of the building has 11 apartments.
