## More Paintings Added To Exhibit

Jacksonville, August 26—In addition to the water colors of Eugene Bennett's which have been on exhibit at Swem's in Medford, a new group of Bennett paintings has been hung and Jacksonville residents and valley historians will find a new series of landmark paintings now on display.

The additional paintings include the redmen hall, which now houses the J.Villie club on the lower floor and a group of apartments on the second floor; the Beekman home, on the old stage road which is owned and maintained by the Beekman estate; the Protestant church; the Armstrong house; and the Maury-Davis general store.

The old Protestant church which was built by funds subscribed from everyone in Jacksonville in 1854 has hand hewn timbers and a shake roof. It is still in very good repair and can be visited in Jacksonville.

The present city hall is the old Maury-Davis store building. It was the first brick store in Jacksonville.

Our special foreign correspondent, Chris Williams, who has been in France with the Oregon Boy Scout Jamboree group has been busy going to teas, swapping gum for almost anything French, English, Scotch, or Swedish he could get, but he has also had time to write home. The following is one of his letters concerning the Jamboree.

Aug. 11—Monday  
(Washday)

Dear Charity,

Well we've been at the Jamboree since Thursday and have lived through our own cooking. We cook by patrols. The food provided every day by the French is pretty good; powdered milk, eggs for the first time today, vegetables, quite a bit of fish and meat. The U. S. contingent provides us with extra rations of bisquick, orange juice, cocoa, etc.

We have tea every afternoon at four. Every day we have two foreign scouts for lunch, tea and supper. Often we exchange scouts for meals. All the troop works this way.

You've heard, I suppose, that one point of the Jamboree is swapping. We were lectured not to be horse traders to the Europeans. Some of the boys trade like mad. Some have got scotch kilts which are scarce and also rationed in Britain. Some Irish boys wear kilts too. Bright green. On Saturday night we had the

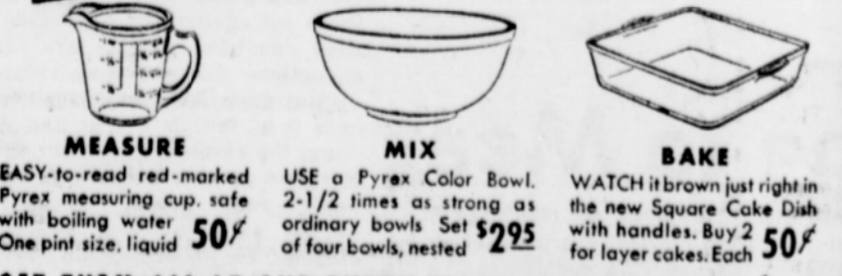
