Jacksonville, August 28-In acdition to the water colors of Eugene Bennett's which have been on exhibit at Swem's in Mediora, a new group of Bennett paintings has been nung and Jacksonville residents and valley historians will find a new series of landmark paintings now on display.

The additional paintings include the Redmen hall, which now houses the J'ville club on the lower Hoor and a group of apartments on the second floor; the Beekman home, on the old stage road which is owned and maintained by the Beekman estate; the Protestant church; the Armstrong house; and the Maury-Davis general store.

The old Protestant church which was built by funds subscribed from everyone in Jacksonville in 1854 has hand hewn timbers and a shake roof. It is still in very good repair and can ve visited in Jacksonville.

The present city hall is the old Maury-Davis store building. It was the first brick store in Jacksonville.
