SCHOOL BELLS WILL RING IN PHOENIX MONDAY, SEPT. 8th

Phoenix, Sept. 3—School bells will peal in Phoenix Monday morning, September 8, according to Donald E. Hembry, superintendent of school. Registration will take place Monday morning with the bus scheduled to operate at the regular time.

Grade school teachers this year at Phoenix will be: first grade, Ethel Morrison; second grade, Virginia Wickersham; third grade, Edith Thompson; fourth grade, Alzada Massey; fifth grade, Gladys Sloan; seventh grade, Orva Taylor; and eighth grade, John E. Meyers who will also act as grade school principal.

In the high school this year Harry Myers will teach music on Wednesdays and Saturdays; Mabel Sims will teach English and Chorus; Leona Patton will be in charge of Physical Education for girls and will also be the lunch supervisor; Edgar Messick will teach history, social science, dramatics and speech; Harold Massey will be the basketball and baseball coach; George Sanders will teach commercial subjects and will coach football and track.

According to Superintendent Hembry the school will see a greater enrollment this year than during any previous time. Two

hundred and fifty students are expected to enroll in the grades and 10 in high school.
