Would Create Straight Route to Nevada Street

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Billings, long time Ashland residents this morning announced that they would give a 60 foot right-of-way through their property for the purpose of establishing a truck lane to by-pass Ashland.

This grant would provide for a half mile roadway through the Billings ranch and it would give a straight-of-way from the junction east of Dutch Gus' direct to the west end of Nevada street.

Last Friday Billings told Mayor Thornton Wiley of his offer, and Billings has also, through city councilman John Nosler, invited the city council to view the property.

Billings stated today that he planned to ask William Briggs, who heads the mayor's recently appointed highway study committee, to view the grant and to recommend such action as the highway committee deemed advisable.

The grant includes a 60 foot right-of-way. If more than 60 foot is deemed necessary, Billings state that payment for the additional footage would be ex-

If the city would accept the grant and then give the state right-of-way for a truck route on through the remainder of the city the cost of construction should be appreciably lessened.
