Drivers Can Renew Licenses at C. of C.

Ashland motorists whose driver's licenses are void can now renew them at the office of the Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. William Healy has been appointed by the secretary of state to renew licenses for this city. Previous to her appointment licenses had to be renewed in Medford.

All driver's licenses below 5R-99,000 are already void, as the new law adopted by the 1947 legislature has set up a procedure whereby driver's licenses expire by serial number, rather than by expiration date.

Permits numbered between 5R-99,000 and 5R-132,000 will expire during September. No individual notices are sent to drivers upon the expiration of the permits. Motorists who renew their permits at the Chamber of Commerce offices will receive their new license by mail.
