School Schedules
Six Night Classes

Six evening classes are scheduled for the fall term at Southern Oregon they are: An art course in Crafts, which includes the making of block prints, wood-carving, weaving, etc. This will be offered on Tuesday evenings from 7 to 10 o'clock by Associate Professor Otto Wilda. The course carries two credits which may be used toward state teacher certification. Associate Professor Edith Bork will teach a course in Tests and Measurements, also on Tuesday, 7 - 10 p.m. This will carry three credit hours. The above two courses will begin on September 30th.

Beginning on October 1st, Dr. Russell Elliott will offer a three-hour course in Contemporary Problems on Wednesday evenings from 7 - 10. Beginning on Thursday evenings from 7-10 by Dr. Arthur Taylor in History of Oregon, and Mr. Clifford Williams in School Organization and School Law. These are required courses for teaching certification.

On Monday nights, beginning September 29th, Mr. Glenn Matthews will direct orchestra rehearsals which are open to all musicians who wish to participate in concerts given by the orchestra during the school year.

The registration fee for work carrying a maximum of six college credits is \$8.50 per term. Enrollments will be accepted until October 11.

At a meeting of the executive board of the Jackson County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in Medford last Tuesday night, Vern Smith, Ashland, was re-elected to the post of chairman. To assist Smith as staff officers are: Harry Chipman, vice-chairman; Mrs. Lewis Ulrich, secretary-treasurer; Mrs. Elwood Hedberg, chairman of the women's division; Mrs. Glenn O. Taylor, education chairman; Mrs. Moore Hamilton, publicity chairman, and Dr. A. E. Merkel, medical adviser and Mrs. Blanche Frisbie, advisory nurse.

The Board voted to send \$4,000 to the three agencies in Portland which have been yearly recipients of funds from this chapter: The Shrine hospital, the Doernbecker hospital and the Crippled Children's division of the University of Oregon Medical school. Many Jackson county cases are cared for in these institutions and clinics are conducted in Medford each year by the Crippled Children's clinic.

Run Expected on
Piggie Banks Soon

Ashland motorists will be digging for pennies and nickels and contents of piggy banks will be in demand when the Magee-Hale Company of Oklahoma City completes the installation of the 210 parking meters which will be placed on Main street in Ashland from Helman to Gresham streets and a half block each way on intersecting streets.

Lawrence C. Skinner, installation engineer for the company states that all the meters should be installed by Monday. Work began Wednesday afternoon with the drilling of holes and Skinner states that the installation of the meter post is a job usually performed simultaneously but that a shortage of labor had made it impossible.

Z. A. Zimmerlee, Ashland contractor is supplying the labor and equipment for the job. Zimmerlee states that Thursday will see more men on the job and that installation of meters would begin immediately.

Trustee Board
Is Recommended
To City CouncilLugar Claims Hospital
Is People's Problem; Is
Not Council's Nor M.D.'s

Robert Lugar, Community hospital administrative head, recommended to the members of the city council Thursday morning that the hospital be operated by a board of trustees, separate from the council and separate from the board of doctors who are presently operating the hospital under a lease from the city.

Lugar's proposal was made during a breakfast meeting of the city council and doctors at the hospital. Present were: Drs. Chas Haynes, Harvey Woods, Edward Brown, Walter Kresse, and E. G. Everett; council members who attended the meeting included Mayor Thornton Wiley, Dr. Walter Redford, Jake Weitzel, John Noster, and John Daugherty, William Briggs, city attorney, and Elmer Beigel, city superintendent were also present. Both the doctors present and the members of the council accepted the proposal of a separate board of trustees as being the best possible solution to the problem's confronting the community hospital.

Lugar pointed out that the hospital should be a responsibility of the people of the community and that a group of citizens should be found who are cognizant of the problems facing the present hospital and who are willing to devote their time to planning for a new hospital and acting as an executive board for the hospital management.

"The city government is interested in a good hospital," Mayor Wiley pointed out, "and the members of the council are willing to follow any good plan which will give the city a good hospital."

Possibility that Federal money would soon be available for rebuilding was discussed and Briggs, city attorney, stated that he would contact the Winburn heirs to discuss with them the procedure necessary to convert the present hospital.
