\$1500 Needed to Get Juvenile Officer

Because there is a need for at least \$1500 in sight to augment the yearly \$3,000 salary allotted, in order to attract professionally qualified applicants for the Jackson County juvenile officer's post, now going begging, representatives of civic groups on Judge Herbert K. Hanna's county-wide juvenile committee this week are turning to their separate organizations for help.

It is hoped that at the end of this fiscal year, the county court may allow the needed boost in this salary to hold such a qualified officer. Concerned over the mounting delinquency and dependency cases now facing the juvenile court, the committee pledged themselves at last Saturday's meeting to act as quickly as possible to obtain the necessary funds in order to secure the services of one of the top-notch prospects they have in sight for the job.

Should there develop a surplus of funds as a result of the drive, they shall be held in reserve and earmarked for juvenile work throughout the county. In the interest of prevention of delinquency, it is hoped later that recreational outlets for Jackson County children will be provided with some of the added funds.

According to Al Simpson this will be one of the roughest games of the season. Speaking about this game earlier in the season Al said, "We figure that maybe if we get those Humboldt boys up in the high altitude at Klamath they'll wear out quicker and we'll have a better chance."

The game will be the first conference game of the season for the Raiders who are members of the Far Western conference. So far SOC has tumbled Portland university Frosh and Eastern Oregon college of education.

Humboldt is unbeaten this year having won a game from the University of San Francisco Jr. varsity and having also beaten Oregon college of education.
