Vote In Phoenix Follows State No

Phoenix, Oct. 9—Citizens of Phoenix and rural areas firmly advocated the sales and cigarette tax issues on October 7th. The final count of the vote revealed that the voters of East Phoenix voted 42 yes; 35 no on the sales tax and 58 yes; and 69 no on the cigarette tax.

Voters of West Phoenix registered 58 yes; 132 no on the sales tax and 75 yes; 111 no on the cigarette tax.
