

SCHOOL BUS DRIVERS ATTEND A SCHOOL IN JACKSONVILLE

Jacksonville, Oct. 8—Thirty-six school bus drivers from Jackson and Josephine counties attended a one-day session of instruction held at the Jacksonville schools Tuesday, September 30. G. B. Goddard, Superintendent of the Jacksonville schools was host and A. H. Wright, State Supervisor of Transportation instructed.

Oregon State Traffic regulations and school bus laws were discussed during the morning followed by two instructive motion pictures, Messrs. R. D. Kruhm and Robert Appleton, representatives of the Northwest Truckstell Sales, Inc. presented a picture on automobile differentials which gave in detail the mechanism of the new improved differential now available to busses and trucks.

Mr. Wright presented a picture "Precious Cargo" which centered around safety measures necessary for the welfare of our children riding in busses. Lunch was served at noon in the school cafeteria by Mrs. Lottie Bowman, of the cafeteria staff.

The afternoon session opened with an explanation by Mr. Wright regarding state support or transporting pupils to and from school.

The balance of the afternoon was spent in open discussion of bus driving conditions and many helpful suggestions were exchanged. One of the most important was the importance of a state law being enacted prohibiting any vehicle from passing a school bus which was stopped while children were boarding or leaving the bus. It was stated the largest percentage of accidents to children riding on busses are directly caused by

motorists passing stopped school busses without slowing down.

Another meeting of the drivers is anticipated early in the spring and it is hoped that the inauguration of this meeting will stimulate other counties in Oregon to follow.

Two Councilmen To Be Elected Nov. 4

Jacksonville, Oct. 8—There will be a special election for the city of Jacksonville November 4, when two city councilmen will be elected. Candidates desiring to file for the offices are required to submit their petitions by October 22. The two councilmen to be elected are City Treasurer, and City recorder.

At a special meeting of the City Council in September, H. A. Bernston tendered his resignation as Mayor of Jacksonville, stating that municipal affairs have become so numerous and pressing that they require more time than he has to devote to that office. Albert Heckert was appointed to fill the office of mayor.

Saloon Converted To Cold Storage Plant

Jacksonville, Oct. 8—The interior of the old Table Rock Billiard and Saloon building on Oregon street which has been undergoing remodeling for the past several months now houses the Jacksonville Cold Storage. Morton Sillesen and Clair Ewart, owners and operators of the new Jacksonville business, state their plant is furnished with modern equipment and is fully equipped to do custom meat cutting and includes a cooling room, sharp freezing unit and five hundred and ninety-three lockers. The majority of the lockers are ten cubic feet in size with some in larger sizes.

Four large compressors serve the plant, two servicing the locker room and one each for the deep freeze unit and cooling room. The plant is so equipped that in event of failure of any one of the compressors the other compressors will carry the emergency load until repairs can be made.

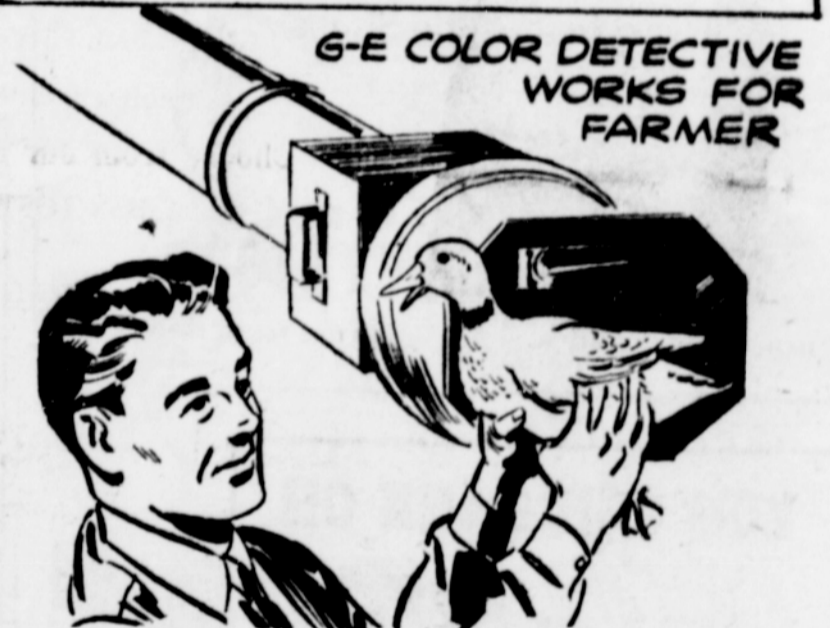
