School Situation Is Presented To Local Lions Club

L. Linn States That \$300,000 Is Needed For Washington School

Education received major emphasis Tuesday evening at the Ashland Lions club meeting when Dr. J. F. Cramer, Director of General Extension for the State Board of Education, and Superintendent of Ashland schools, Leland P. Linn told of state and local education problems.

Dr. Cramer told of the various types of service which the Extension Service offers, such as correspondence courses as well as the various classes being held in Oregon.

When the permanent Oregon school of higher education is able to handle the enrollment, Vanport College will be closed, Cramer stated.

In presenting the building needs of School District 5, Linn recommended a program that would call for the extension of a levy comparable with the one now being made for building purposes. The five year 7-mill levy which was voted by the freeholders in 1944 has one more year to run, he pointed out. At that time there will be approximately \$100,000 in the fund he estimated. He stated that the last session of the legislature passed a law that permits the voters to bond up to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation of a district.

This law will be in effect until July 1, 1949 and at that time the ceiling will drop back to 5 per cent. He said that the voters could borrow \$300,000 and stated further that at the present costs it will take about that amount to replace the Washington building. Needs at Lincoln and the Senior High were also stressed.

The most startling figure quoted on enrollment was that in 1941 there were 75 in the first grade while at present there are 140 beginners. It was also stated that when the present 126 sixth graders started to school in September 1942, they numbered 79. This gives some indication of the number of new families in the district. Superintendent Linn said that the fact that the district is out of debt, makes the picture much brighter than in those places that face a building program with old buildings still to be paid for.
